CIVIC 2030 is a wonderful, thought-out plan on reforms to make government work better, for the people.

I would also propose the following:

- **1.** Requiring increased parking for Community Use Facilities, in certain districts and ending the parking waiver in some districts
- 2. The NYPD must build a new police precinct or satellite precinct in Northeast Queens
- 3. End the pocket veto City Planning has when it comes to certifying land use (ULURP) applications, by allowing the City Council to certify applications after a set period has past and an application is considered complete.
- 4. Create a "One City One Toll" plan, similar to the one city, one fare program MetroCard uses. This would allow residents to travel around New York City and not pay more than one toll if they use multiple toll bridges/tunnels.
- 5. Use school roofs for green roofs (planting) to save energy, help clean the air and provide a unique educational environment for students. Also, use school roofs and other government buildings/structures for solar panels, which would improve the health of our environment, provide alternative energy and create jobs.
- 6. Target the uninsured, especially low income residents, with programs like Health Plus, Child Health Plus and HealthyNY to provide them access to low costs and/or free health insurance.
- 7. Make all data from 311, Community Boards and the Public Advocate's office open to all residents, in real time.
- 8. Decentralize the office of Public Advocate, to bring government closer to the people, opening a satellite office in every borough.
